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## Targeted Early Intervention (TEI) services - year to date (YTD) data

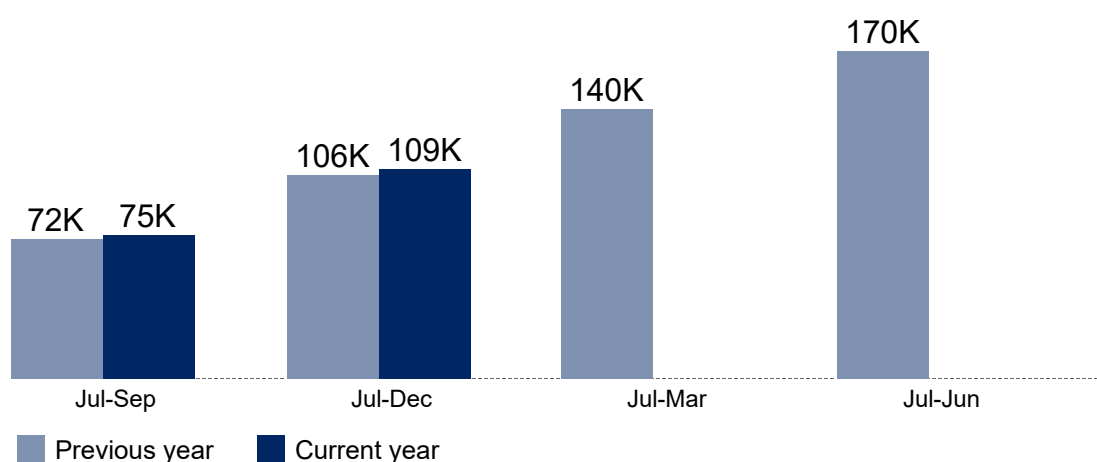


How many **individual clients** were seen in TEI from the first day of the financial year to the end of the quarter?

Chart 1: TEI - Individual clients seen (YTD)

There were approximately **109K** individual clients who received TEI services from 1 July 2023 to 31 December 2023.

When compared with the same period in the previous year of **106K** individual clients who received TEI services, this is an increase of approximately **3K**.

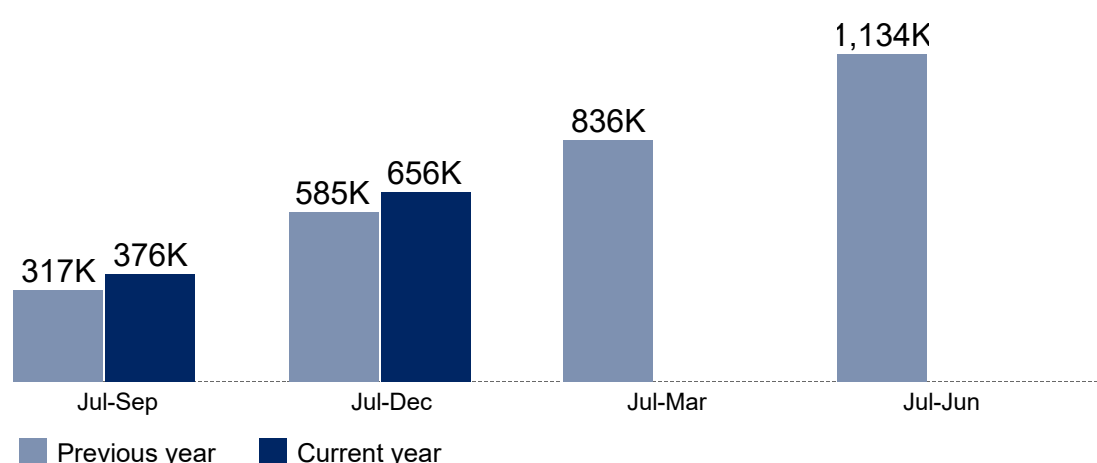


How many **group clients** were seen in TEI from the first day of the financial year to the end of the quarter?

There were approximately **656K** group clients who received TEI services from 1 July 2023 to 31 December 2023.

When compared with the same period in the previous year of **585K** group clients who received TEI services, this is an increase of approximately **71K**.

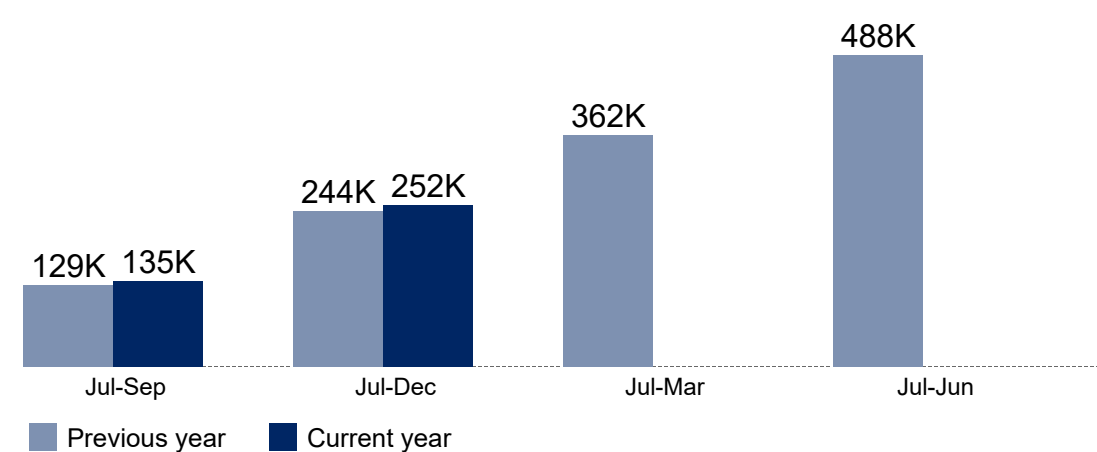


How many **total sessions** were delivered in TEI from the first day of the financial year to the end of the quarter?

There were approximately **252K** TEI sessions delivered from 1 July 2023 to 31 December 2023.

When compared with the same period in the previous year of **244K** TEI sessions delivered, this is an increase of approximately **8K**.

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## Child and young person concern reports



**Child and young person concern reports** received from reporter agencies and how these reports were classified

A total of **107,774** child and young person concern reports were received in the January to March 2024 quarter. Of these concern reports reported in the quarter,

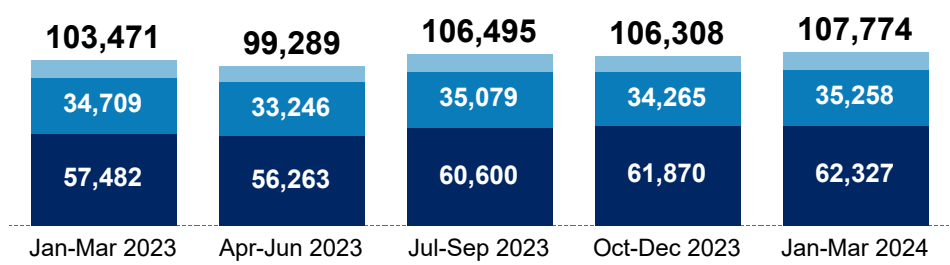
- **57.8%** met the risk of significant harm (ROSH) threshold,
- **32.7%** were assessed as not meeting the ROSH threshold, and
- **9.5%** were classified as other.

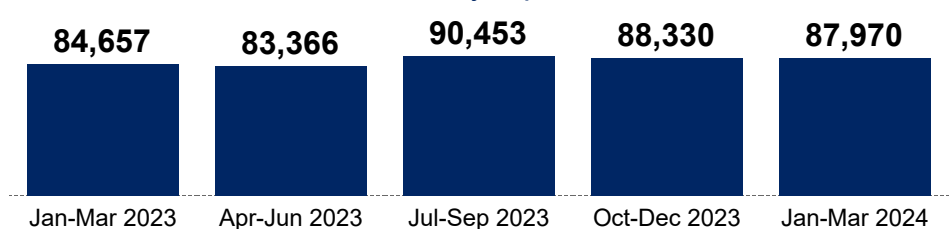

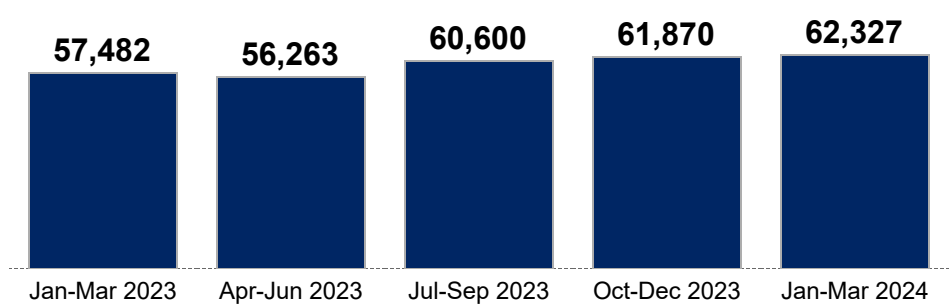

Assessment of child and young person concern reports to determine if they meet the **statutory ROSH threshold**

There were **62,327** ROSH reports in the January to March 2024 quarter. This is equivalent to an increase of **0.7%** from the previous quarter.

Compared with the same quarter last year of **57,482**, this represents a growth of **8.4%**.



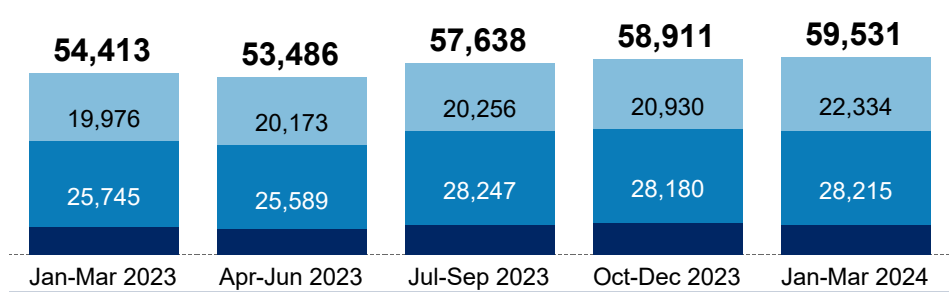

Chart 4: **ROSH reports** by response priority\*



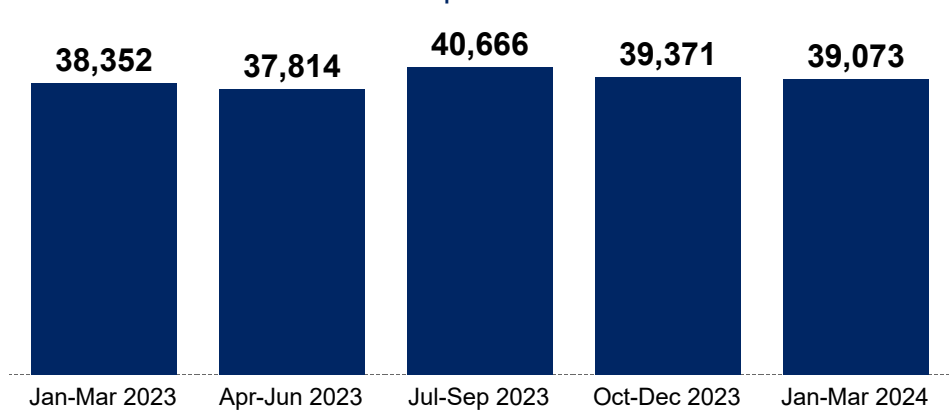

## Children and young people involved in concern reports

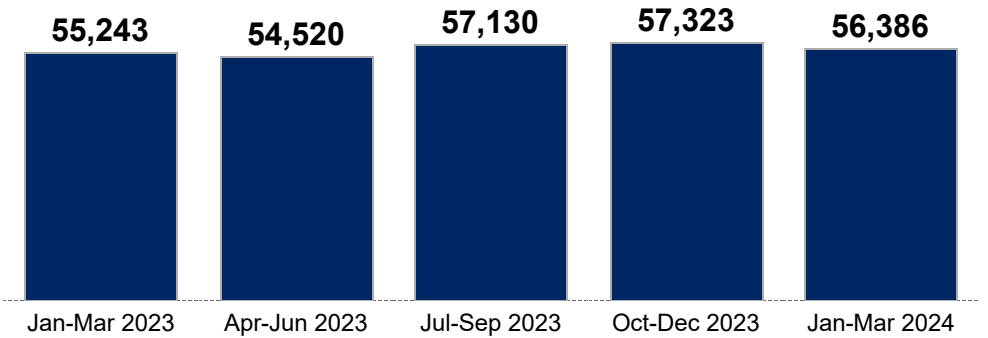


How many **children and young people** were involved in child and young person **concern reports** during the quarter?

There were **56,386** children and young people involved in concern reports in the January to March 2024 quarter, a decrease of **1.6%** from the previous quarter.

When compared with the same quarter in the previous year of **55,243**, this is an increase of **2.1%**.

How many **children and young people** were involved in **ROSH reports** during the quarter?

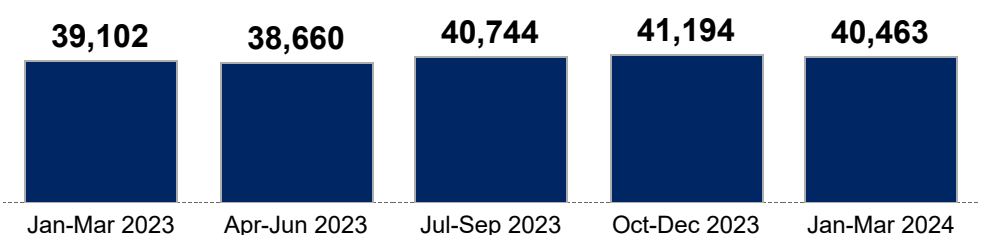
A total of **40,463** children and young people involved in ROSH reports in NSW in the January to March 2024 quarter. This translates to a decline of **1.8%** from the previous quarter.

When compared with the same quarter in the previous year of **39,102**, this is an increase of **3.5%** or **1,361** children and young people.

How many **children and young people** were **seen** by a DCJ caseworker during the quarter?

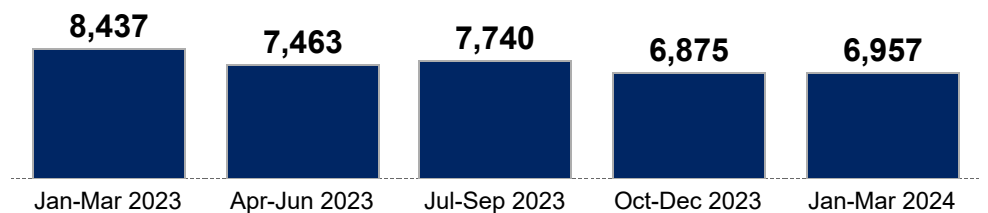
A total of **6,957** children and young people involved in ROSH reports who were seen by a DCJ caseworker in NSW in the January to March 2024 quarter. This represents a rise of **1.2%** from the previous quarter.

When compared with the same quarter in the previous year of **8,437**, this is a decrease of **17.5%** or **1,480** children and young people.

Chart 3: **Children and young people** involved in ROSH reports during the quarter who were seen<sup>3</sup>



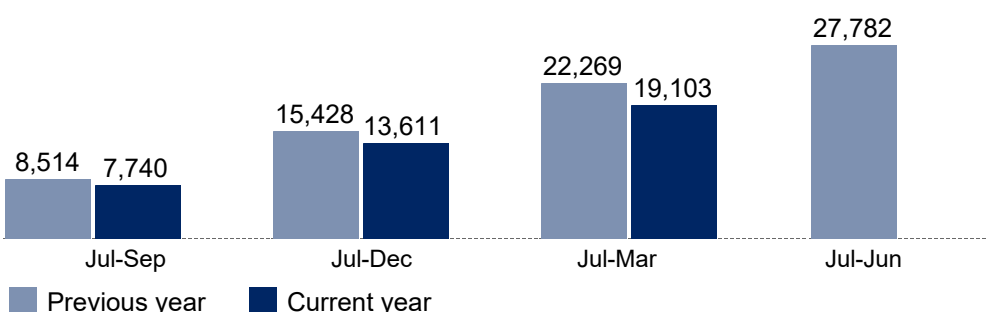
How many **children and young people** were **seen** by a DCJ caseworker from the first day of the financial year to the end of the quarter?

A total of **19,103** children and young people involved in ROSH reports who were seen by a DCJ caseworker from July 2023 to March 2024.

When compared with the same period in the previous year of **22,269** children and young people, this is a decrease of **3,166** children and young people who were seen by a DCJ caseworker.

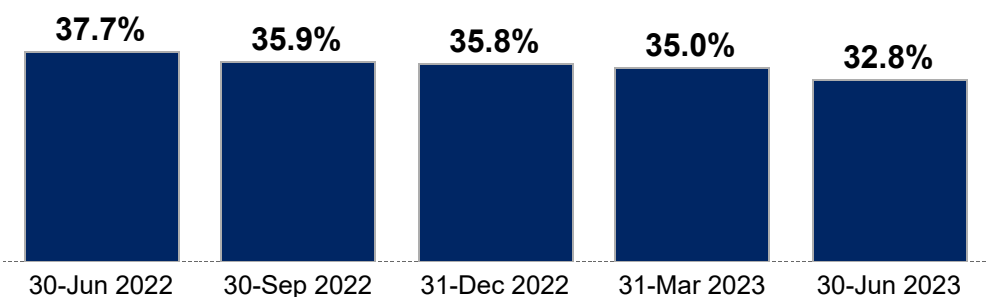
Chart 4: **Children and young people** involved in ROSH reports who were seen YTD



What is the percentage of children and young people re-reported at ROSH within 12 months of case plan closure **by the end of the quarter**<sup>4</sup>?

By 30 June 2023, **32.8%** of children and young people were re-reported at ROSH within 12 months of case plan closure (Target 32.3% by June 2023).

2. Prior to 2022-23, District in the **Children and young people involved in ROSH report** measure refer to the District of the **first** ROSH during the quarter. From Q1 2022-23, District is updated to be the sub-cohort of children seen only to align with the Children Seen measure.
3. District in **Children Seen** measure refers to District associated with the ROSH report during the reporting period that had the earliest submitted Safety/Alternative Assessment.
4. Based on the cohort of children who had closed cases during the 12 month period with case closure reasons of either (i) *case plan goal achieved* OR (ii) *no further intervention required*. These children are followed up for 12 months following care closure to determine what proportion is reported within that 12 month follow up period ending the last day of the reported quarter.

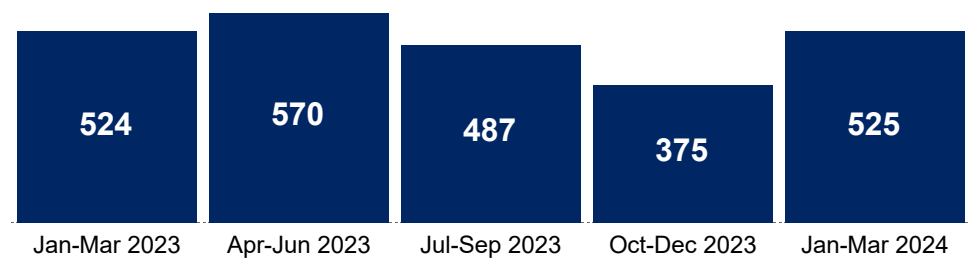
### Children and young people entering care during the quarter

A total of **525** children and young people entered OOHC in the January to March 2024 quarter. This translates to a rise of **40.0%** or **150** children and young people, when compared with the previous quarter.

When compared with the same quarter last year of **524** children and young people entering care, this is comparable to the result of the same quarter last year.

Chart 1: Children and young people entering OOHC<sup>4</sup> by age at entry



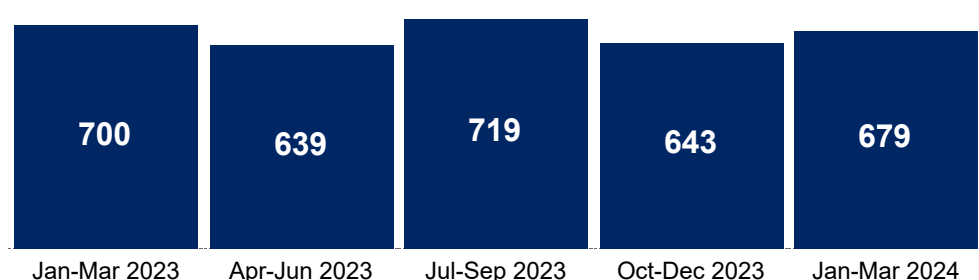
### How many children and young people exited OOHC during the quarter?

There were **679** children and young people exiting OOHC in the January to March 2024 quarter. This is an increase of **5.6%** or **36** children and young people from the previous quarter.

Compared with the same quarter last year of **700** children and young people exiting OOHC, this is a decrease of **3.0%** or **21** children and young people.

Chart 2: Children and young people exiting OOHC<sup>4</sup> by age at exit



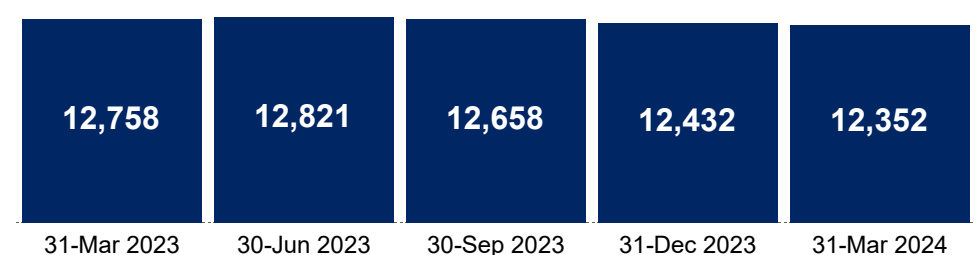

Chart 3: Children and young people in statutory OOHC<sup>4</sup> by Aboriginality and case management responsibility at quarter end

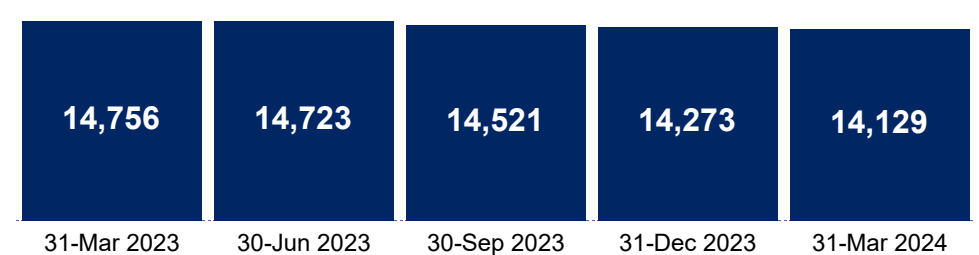


### District of children and young people in need of care and protection

Chart 5: Children and young people in OOHC<sup>4</sup> by placement type at quarter end



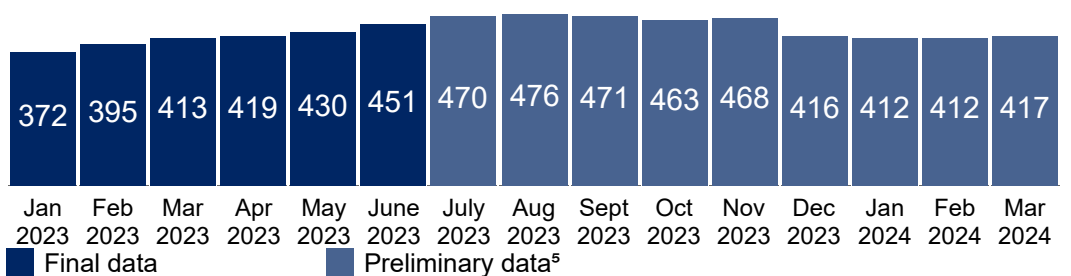
### Children and young people in High Cost Emergency Arrangements (HCEA)

Chart 6: Children and young people in HCEA<sup>4</sup> at month end

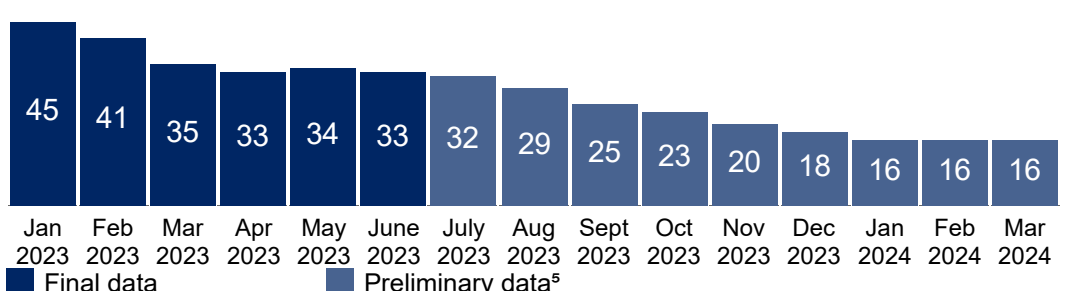


### Children and young people in Special OOHC

There were **16** children and young people in Special OOHC at the end of Mar 2024. It remained the same number of children and young people when compared with the previous month. Compared with the same month of the previous year, the result is a decrease of **54.3%** or **19** children and young people.

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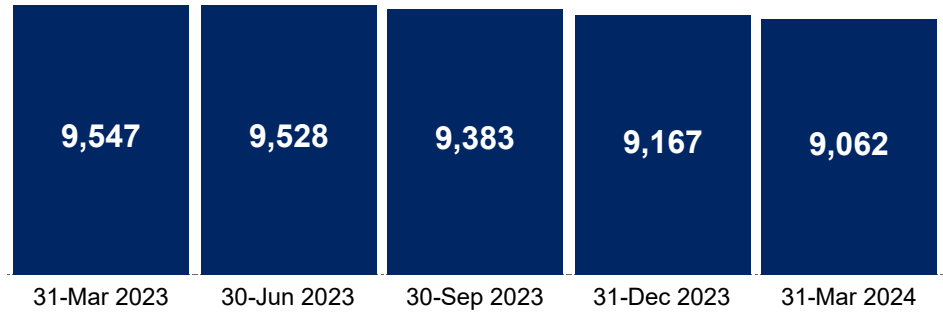
## Stable and nurturing environments for children and young people

### Better placements and matching for children and young people in care

At 31 March 2024, there were **9,062** children and young people in OOHC with fewer than three placements.

This is equivalent to a decrease of **1.1%** or **105** children and young people from the end of the previous quarter.

### Alternate permanent placement solutions for children and young people in need of care and protection

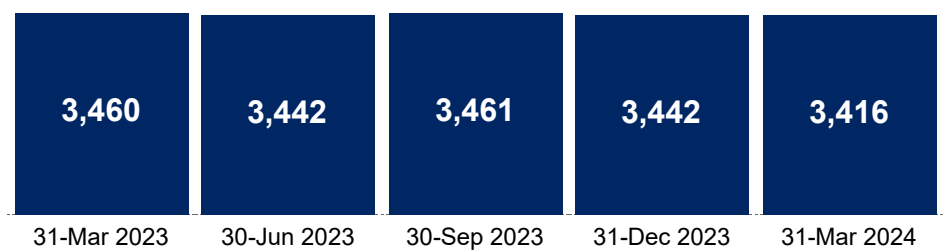
A total of **3,416** children and young people were on Guardianship Orders at 31 March 2024.

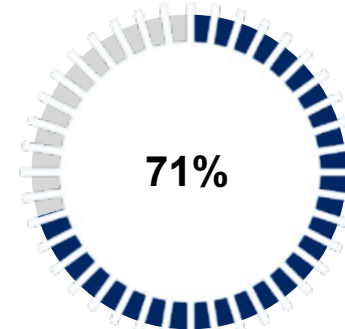
Chart 2: Number of children and young people on Guardianship Orders by Aboriginality and age group
