Overview of the Sexual Violence Fund



Overview

- The fund is a grants program that will fund a range of one-off and time-limited sexual violence early intervention and response projects that address and respond to sexual violence.
- Almost \$10m in total, for projects of up to two years' duration (2023/24-2024/25)
- Focusing on high priority groups

- women and children at risk of or experiencing sexual violence
- First Nations people
- culturally and linguistically diverse communities (including people of refugee, refugee-like experiences and asylum seeker backgrounds)
- rural and remote communities
- LGBTIQ+ people
- older women
- children and young people
 (including in particular those who have experienced trauma,
 sexual and domestic violence and those in or leaving out-of home care)
- people with disability

Overview of Registration of Interest (ROI) stage



A total of 198 ROI forms received.

The majority of these organisations:

- Provide services to:
 - Women and children at risk of or experiencing sexual violence
 - Children and young people (who have experienced trauma, sexual and domestic violence or leaving out-of-home care)
 - Culturally and linguistically diverse communities
- Would be interested in applying for funding to deliver both early intervention and response projects
- Would be seeking funding between \$100k-\$500k
- Would be interested in applying for funding in partnership with either a local government agency or a nonprofit organisation



Evaluation and learning in the grant scheme





Project-level evaluation and reporting, for each funded project

- Proportionate to the scale of each project
- Tailored to the specific nature and goals of each project
- Focused on learning and improvement within the life of the project
- Supported by the program team, e.g. to clarify outcomes and identify relevant data to collect (quantitative and qualitative)
- Will require time and skill as part of the project, e.g. to collect the agreed data and document reflections and lessons learned at several times during the life of the project
- Opportunities to learn from and share with others and contribute insight to the program level evaluation

Program-level evaluation and reporting, for the fund as a whole

- Harvesting outcomes and insights from across the projects
- Sharing insights with stakeholders, to strengthen system capacity
