Fact Sheet for Family Members of a Homicide Victim

The NSW Victims Support Scheme provides support to eligible victims of crime in NSW.

This fact sheet provides information about the support available to people who have been affected by a homicide that happened in NSW. If you have been affected by another type of crime, visit the Victims Services website for information about the support available.

We're here to help

We understand that losing a family member to homicide is a traumatic and painful experience. If you're a family member of someone who has died as a result of a homicide, we can assist you during this difficult time. You can contact Victims Services for free and confidential information, advice and referrals.

The Victims Support Scheme can provide certain family members with:



Counselling



Financial assistance for immediate



Financial assistance for funeral expenses



Financial assistance for justice-related expenses



A recognition payment

Family members who may be eligible for the Victim Support Scheme are:

- Family victims, who are immediate family members of a homicide victim. This includes current spouses, de facto partners who were living with the victim when they died and had been living with them for at least 2 years, parents, step-parents, guardians, children, step-children, guardian children and siblings.
- Related family members who are not family victims. This includes grandparents, grandchildren, aunts, uncles, cousins and in-laws

How to apply for victims support

Complete the Application for Support for a Family Member of a Homicide Victim

This application form is available on the Victims Services website.

Provide a copy of your identification

You need to provide a copy of one form of current governmentissued identification. This could be a:

- birth certificate
- Centrelink card
- change of name certificate
- driver licence
- marriage certificate
- Medicare card
- MIN Card

- photo card
- passport
- SafeWork licence
- SafeWork white card
- screenshot of your MyGov account or another government account.

Please do not send us the original document. Please ensure the copy or image:

- is clear and not blurry
- captures all parts of the identification
- has the same name on the identification as the application form or has supporting evidence such as a change of name certificate.

If you're unable to access your identification document, please contact us to discuss your options.

Attach evidence of your relationship to the homicide victim

If you are applying for financial assistance or a recognition payment, you need to provide documentation with your application which confirms your relationship to the homicide victim. This could be a birth certificate, marriage certificate, relationship certificate, death certificate or Medicare card. If you are claiming as a de facto partner of the homicide victim, you need to provide evidence that shows you were living with them when they died and had lived with them for at least 2 years.

Attach evidence of your financial dependence on the homicide victim

If you are applying for a recognition payment as a family member who was financially dependent on the homicide victim, you must submit at least one document that shows evidence of your dependency.

Attach evidence of expenses you are claiming

If you are applying for financial assistance, you need to provide evidence of the expenses you are claiming, such as receipts and itemised tax invoices. You can complete a Family Victims Travel Expense Claim form if claiming costs for travel as a result of the homicide.

For more information about the types of documentation to provide, visit the Victims Services website. If the original documents are not in English, you will need to provide the original document and an English translation.

- * Service providers, such as funeral directors and forensic cleaners, can apply for financial assistance for immediate needs (crime scene cleaning) and financial assistance for funeral expenses. If payment is approved, this amount will be paid from the amount of financial assistance available to an eligible family victim.
- ^This is not required if you are a child of the homicide victim and were under 18 years of age at the time of the homicide.

Important information

Some people are not eligible for victims support, even if they are a victim of crime. For more information on persons who are not eligible, see section 25 of the *Victims Rights and Support Act 2013*. There are also circumstances where support may be declined or the amount reduced. For more information on those circumstances, see section 44 of the *Victims Rights and Support Act 2013*. Factors to be considered under section 44 include, but are not limited to:

- any behaviour on the part of the deceased which has directly or indirectly contributed to their death, including past criminal activity
- any money the applicant has received from another source in relation to the violent crime, including under an insurance policy or other agreement.
