



The views of children and young people in out-of-home care in NSW

Findings from the 2018 NSW Out-Of-Home Care (OOHC) and Residential Care Surveys

The 2018 NSW OOHC and Residential Care Surveys asked children and young people (8-17 years) about their views and experiences in foster care, relative/kinship care and residential care. Data from these two surveys were provided to the Australian Institute of Health and Welfare (AIHW) to inform the National OOHC Survey.



Key findings
