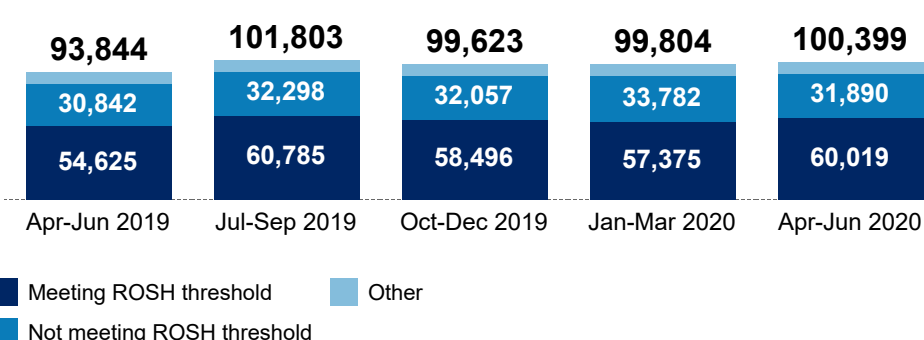

A total of **100,399** child and young person concern reports were received in the April to June 2020 quarter. Of these concern reports reported in the quarter,

- **59.8%** met the risk of significant harm (ROSH) threshold,
- **31.8%** were assessed as not meeting the ROSH threshold, and
- **8.5%** were classified as other.



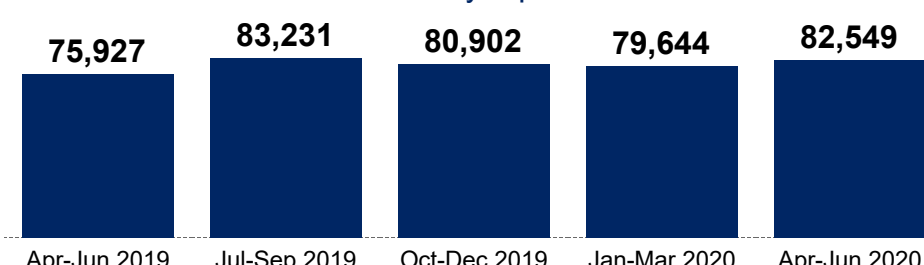

Chart 2: Child and young person **concern reports** from mandatory reporters



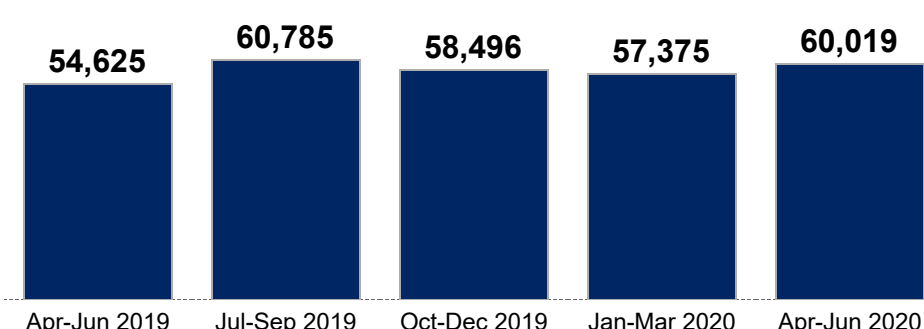
The DCJ Child Protection Helpline received **82,549** child and young person concern reports in the April to June 2020 quarter.

Compared with the same quarter last year of **54,625**, this represents a growth of **9.9%**.



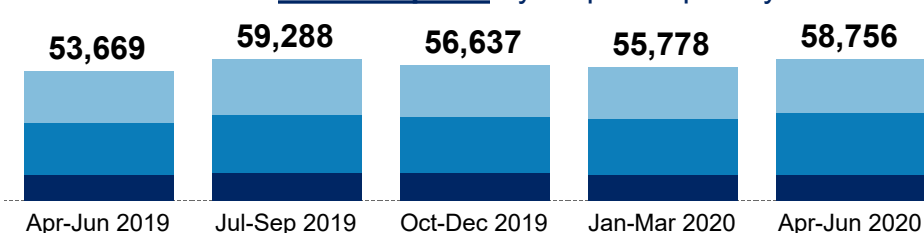

- 22,570** reports were classified as requiring a response in 10 days.

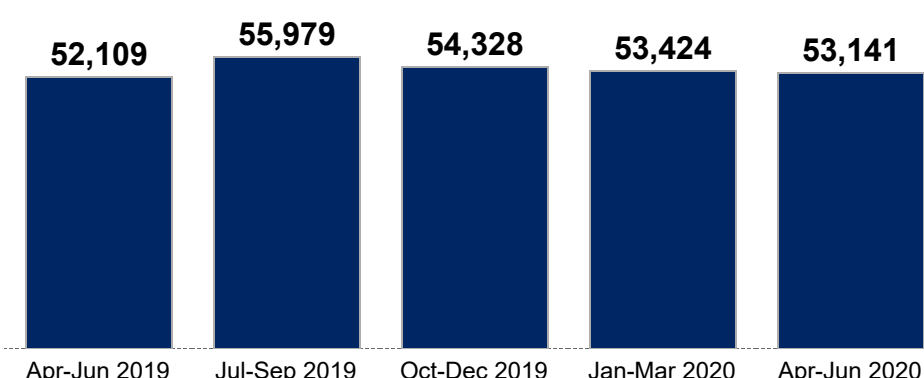

There were **53,141** children and young people involved in concern reports in the April to June 2020 quarter, a decrease of **0.5%** from the previous quarter.



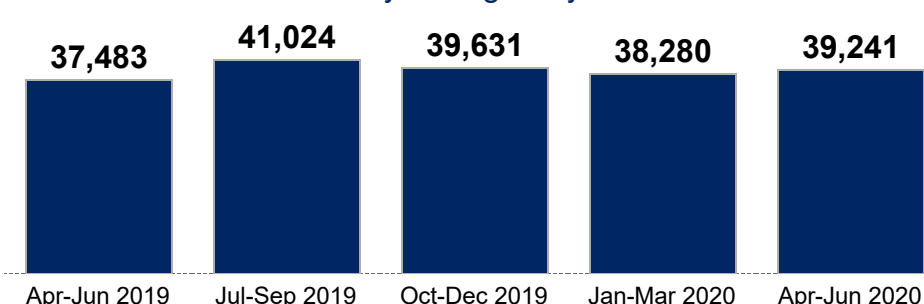

When compared with the same quarter in the previous year of **37,483**, this is an increase of **4.7%** or **1,758** children and young people.

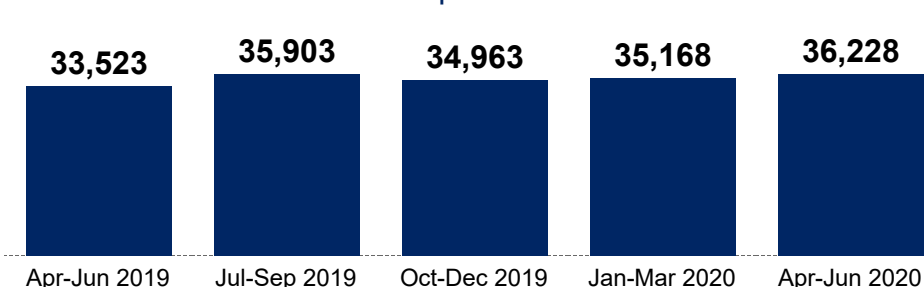

### Children and young people entering care during the quarter

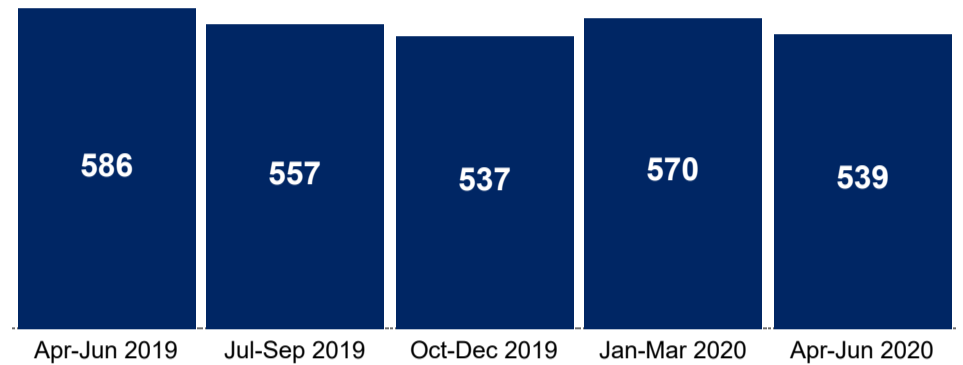


A total of **539** children and young people entered OOHC<sup>7</sup> in the April to June 2020 quarter. This represents a reduction of **5.4%** or **31** children and young people, when compared with the previous quarter.

When compared with the same quarter last year of **586** children and young people entering care, this is a decrease of **8.0%** or **47** children and young people.

### How many children and young people exited OOHC<sup>7</sup> during the quarter?

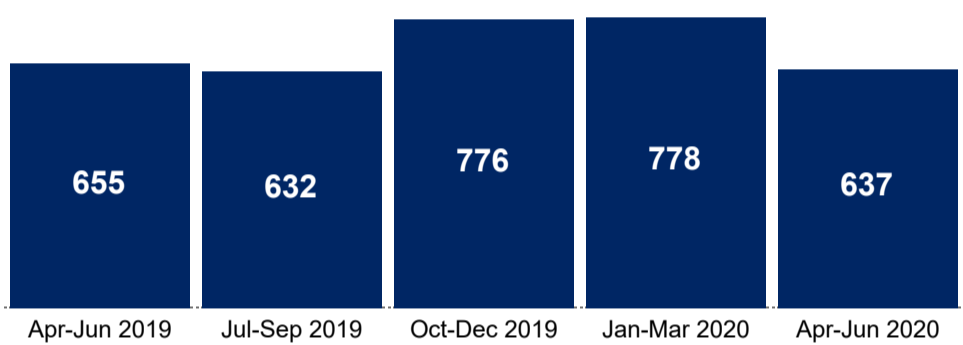

Chart 2: Children and young people exiting OOHC<sup>7</sup> by age at exit



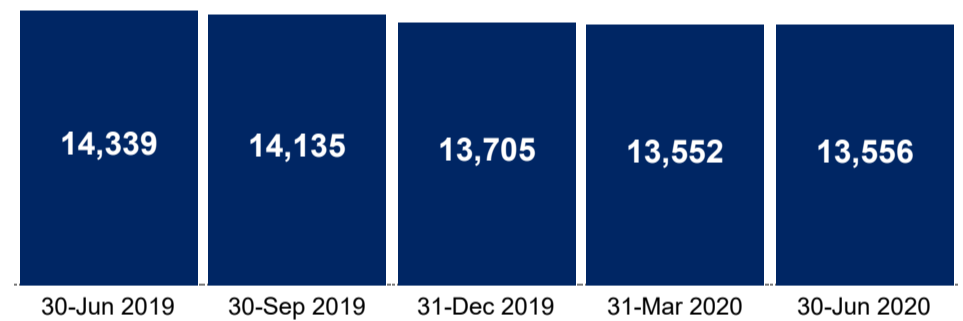
### Children and young people in need of care and protection by placement provider

Chart 3: Children and young people in statutory OOHC<sup>7</sup> by Aboriginality and placement provider at quarter end



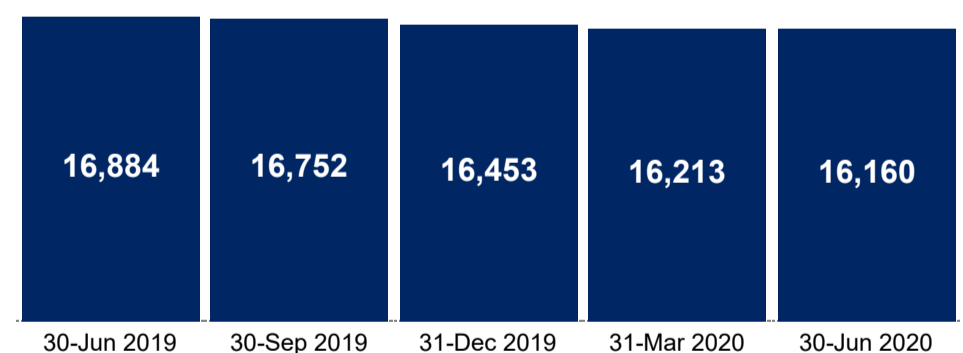
### Placement of children and young people in need of care and protection

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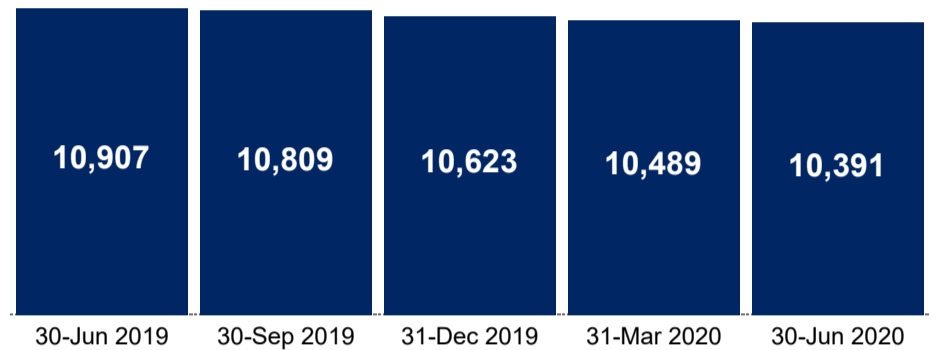
## Stable and nurturing environments for children and young people

### Better placements and matching for children and young people in care

At 30 June 2020, there were **10,391** children and young people in OOHC with fewer than three placements.

This is equivalent to a decrease of **0.9%** or **98** children and young people from the end of the previous quarter.

### Alternate permanent placement solutions for children and young people in need of care and protection

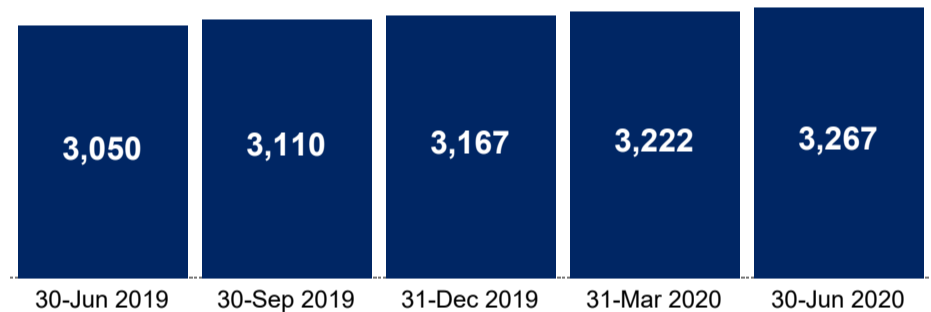
A total of **3,267** children and young people were on Guardianship Orders at 30 June 2020.

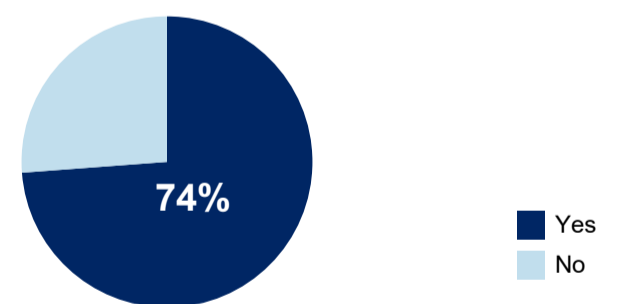
Chart 2: Number of children and young people on Guardianship Orders by Aboriginality and age group
